- 18. Truly, truly, I say to you, when you were younger, you used to gird yourself and walk wherever you wished; but when you grow old, you will stretch out your hands and someone else will gird you, and bring you where you do not wish to go. "
- 19. Now this He said, signifying by what kind of death he would glorify God. And when He had spoken this, He *said to him, "Follow Me!"
- 20. Peter, turning around, *saw the disciple whom Jesus loved following them; the one who also had leaned back on His bosom at the supper and said, "Lord, who is the one who betrays You?"
- 21. So Peter seeing him *said to Jesus, "Lord, and what about this man?"
- 22. Jesus *said to him, "If I want him to remain until I come, what is that to you? You follow Me!"

	i.	"truly, truly" The disciples had heard Jesus use this expression many times during His earthly ministry. When they heard it they knew that
		what was heard afterwards was something that was very
		and needed to be listened to and heeded to without question.
	ii.	Jesus showed Peter an illustration about life in general and related it to a
		future event in his own life that foretells his own in
		martyrdom for the sake of Christ and glory of God.
	iii.	Jesus had just finished telling Peter to " My lambs"
		(spiritually speaking, newborns/babes in Christ), He then had instructed
		him to " My Sheep" (spiritually, those who were more
		spiritually mature who needed guidance and instruction from a pastor),
		and finally Jesus commanded him to " My Sheep" (take
		care of the spiritually mature in their old age and beyond because they
		will not only need one to shepherd them, but also one to tend to them as
		well). As Jesus states the needs of people as they progress through the
		stages of life (physical/mental/spiritual), He transitions into a reference
		to Peter's own life.
	iv.	Peter, when he was younger was able to "gird" himself and go and come
		as he pleased, but Jesus was letting him know that a time was going to
		come when he was old that he would "stretch out" his hands and
		"someone else will gird" him, and bring him where he "[did] not wish to
		go." What did Jesus mean when He said that Peter's hands would be

	i.	Peter hearing from Jesus about what his fate would be, turned around
		and "saw the disciple whom Jesus loved following them". Who was this
		disciple?
	ii.	We see from this verse that Jesus and Peter were actually in motion as
		they together along the beach.
	iii.	John, out of all the things identifying himself as that disciple, mentions
		that this disciple was the one who had "also leaned back on His bosom at
		the supper and said, 'Lord, who is the one who betrays you?'" What may
		have been the reason why John included this information at this time?

	I.	Peter and John were very close friends and members of the "inner circle"
		of Jesus' disciples. Peter, hearing what his fate would be, had
		for his spiritual brother in Christ and asked, "what about this man?"
	ii.	Others have suggested that maybe his inquiry was not so honorable and
	11.	that in his heart He wanted to know how and when John would
		eventually die and the circumstances surrounding his death. Jesus knew
		what was in Peter's heart when he asked, and whatever it was it
		prompted Jesus to answer Peter in the manner in which He did.

		Jesus, having better insight into what was going on in Peter's heart,
		answered the question in a hypothetical way, that spoke to the heart of
		the matter and addressed whatever was going on in Peter's heart. What
		was Jesus saying when He said, "If I want him to remain until I come,
		what is that to you?" [discussion]

ii.	Was Jesus, once again asking Peter to "follow" Him along the beach, or was there a deeper meaning that was being emphasized? [discussion]
die; ye	ore this saying went out among the brethren that that disciple would not t Jesus did not say to him that he would not die, but only, "If I want him ain until I come, what is that to you?" (v.23)
i.	Sometimes when God speaks, we hear what we want to hear, rather than what He has actually said. This can lead to error, the spreading of misinformation and in some cases outright untruths! How can Christians guard against this problem and avoid making this mistake? [discussion]
ii.	For this saying to go "out among the brethren", they must not have had the clarity and understanding of this statement initially as John evidently did when he penned his gospel much later on in life. Is it possible that John's exile to Patmos and his subsequent long life thereafter (approximately 60 years) could have played a part in perpetuating this misconception of John's supposed "immortality"? [discussion]
iii.	What did Jesus mean when He said, "If I want him to remain until I come, what is that to you?" What was His personal message to Peter? What event was He pointing to in the future concerning Himself? [discussion]

	Regarding the Gospel Bearing His Name (vv.24-25) the disciple who is testifying to these things and wrote these things, and

i.	John, here in this verse, not only identifies himself as the Apostle John,
	"the disciple whom Jesus loved", but also as:
	1. A, because he was a <i>learner</i> and a <i>follower</i>
	of Jesus Christ.
	2. A, because he <i>testified</i> of the things that
	he had seen and heard. 3. A, because he recorded the things that he
	had seen and heard.
	4. A
	recorded and testified of are accurate based not only on his own
	eyewitness, but the credible, collective, eyewitness and testimony of the other Apostles as well.

ii.	John, also in this verse, as he did in many verses refers to himself in the
	person. However, there is more to this than merely
	identifying himself as the writer. John, in a literary fashion and as a
	witness, is signing his name to what would be considered in legal terms,
	an affidavit.

iii. Affidavit:

- 1. **Definition**: a written statement confirmed by oath or affirmation, for use as evidence in court.
- 2. **Synonyms:** testimony, statement, sworn statement, attestation, declaration, avowal, plea, submission, claim, contention, charge, allegation, deposition, representation, asseveration, averment
- b. And there are also many other things which Jesus did, which if they *were written in detail, I suppose that even the world itself *would not contain the books that *would be written. (v.25)
 - John here, reminds his readers that what is contained in his gospel
 account is only a small ______ of what could have been written
 about the earthly _____ of Jesus Christ and the things that
 He did during His first advent.
 - ii. John further drives this point home by his use of *hyperbole* oftentimes used as a literary device to overstate a claim or point, not intended to be taken literally.
 - 1. *Hyperbole:* exaggerated statements or claims not meant to be taken literally.
 - 2. **Synonyms**: exaggeration, overstatement, magnification, amplification, embroidery, embellishment, overplaying, excess, overkill, purple prose, puffery
 - iii. As many as could be counted, though they are so numerous, not even the sands of the earth are enough to fill the earth, because there are other elemental bodies such as water, plants, animals and humans, all of which when compiled, collectively do not and cannot fill the earth completely.
 - iv. John's focus, as stated in John 20:30,31, was specific and his intent was that the purpose of his gospel be clearly seen and understood. That being the case, he only focused on eight (8) signs (John 2:1-12; 4:46-54; 5:1-17; 6:1-14; 6:15-21; 9:1-41; 11:17-45; 21:6) to drive this point home to his readers. It was not the case that he could not have written *more* to help his readers to believe, it was however the case that what he did write was *enough* for his readers to believe!
 - Therefore many other signs Jesus also performed in the presence of the disciples, which are not written in this book; but these have been written so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God; and that believing you may have life in His name. (John 20:30-31 NASB)
